Responsibilities of the FSC

IUSM Faculty Constitution: Article V. Section 3.

This committee shall serve as the primary representative body of the School of Medicine faculty. The members of this committee represent their departments and campuses. This committee shall:

- a. Ensure effective communication between faculty, their departments and campuses, and the respective committees upon which they serve and the Steering Committee,
- b. Identify opportunities and strategies to help advance the Medical School in all mission areas,

PROPOSAL

To expand and rename the

Department of Biostatistics

to the

Department of Biostatistics and Health Data Science



RATIONALE

- 1. Besides biostatisticians, there is no IUSM department home for data scientists and informaticians. Faculty members are appointed across multiple departments
- 2. Creates challenges in recruitment, equity, and P&T
- 3. Consolidation of a broader range of quantitative skills into a single department would significantly strengthen data science research, and enable a broader range of analytical and data management services to be provided to investigators on campus
- 4. The consolidation will create a platform for cross-discipline collaboration and an ecosystem for innovation in analytical methodology, moving the department toward its long-term goal of becoming a national leader in data science innovation

PHASED TRANSITION

- 1. Five PHI faculty currently appointed in Hem/Onc will be transferred fall 2020
 - No impact on faculty appointments or compensation
 - Efforts already underway to adapt dept org structure, P&T guidelines, mentoring program, effort allocations, and other cultural issues
 - New faculty already recruited to begin 2020-2021 academic year
- 2. Update institutional MOU between IUSM and FSPH
- New department chair recruitment to launch early 2021
- 4. Evaluate other potential faculty transfers


August CCSC COVID-19 Updates

CCSC Membership

- Co-chairs: Ashley Inman, MD and Paul Ko, MD
- 41 other members including faculty from all campuses, medical students, and residents



Phase 1 Modifications



- Rearranged course sequence to allow all sessions requiring students to be present in person occur early in the fall semester
 - Human Structure
 - FCP1
 - POCUS
- All other courses are being delivered virtually
- Students are allowed to return to campus for exams



Phase 2 Modifications

- Students will until June 1, 2021 to complete the USMLE Step 1 exam
- Students kept out of clinical environment until June 29, 2020
- During time away students completed the following virtually:
 - Transitions 2
 - 2 hour Interprofessional Education activity
 - 4 week Fundamentals of COVID-19 course
 - 2 week Anesthesia course
 - 2 week Radiology course
 - 6 week Knowledge in Clinical Clerkships (KICC) Start course that included Family Medicine, Internal Medicine, Neurology, OB/Gyn, Pediatrics, Psychiatry, Surgery



Phase 2 Modifications Cont.

- Clinical time in required clerkships shortened so students will still complete Phase 2 on time in April 2021
- Students in the Classes of 2021 and 2022 were given opportunity to enter a dual degree program (MD/MBA; MD/MPH)



Phase 3 Modifications (Class of 2021)

- Graduation requirement to pass Phase 2 OSCE waived for this class
- Virtual curriculum completed April-June 2020
 - 2 week Fundamentals of COVID course
 - 2 week Radiology
 - 2 week Transition to Acting Intern (substitution for Transitions
 3)
 - 2 week ARISE: Awesome Restart into Senior Experiences
- 8 weeks of required core clinical rotations
 - Sub-internship
 - Emergency Medicine
 - Critical Care
- All electives and required courses changed to Satisfactory/Fail grading schema
- USMLE Stép 2 CS testing suspended for next 12-18 months, so Step 2 CS not a graduation requirement for this class
- Away rotations not allowed until further notice



Medical Education Disaster Response Policy

- Passed this past Tuesday the 18th
- Enables the CCSC to formally recognize a major disaster and vote to give decision-making authority to the EAD of Educational Affairs and the Senior Associate Dean for Medical Student Education
- CCSC votes to endorse or implement changes
- Allows rapid curricular changes to be made during major disasters
- CCSC will determine beginning and end date





Pros and Cons of Committee Member Term Limits

Faculty Steering Committee Discussion

PROS

- Opportunity to diversify membership and regularly bring new perspectives
- Way to manage size of committees
- Provides respectful and efficient mechanism for exit of passive, ineffective, or no-show members
- When staggered, helps with balance of continuity and new ideas
- Can help with recruitment when people know it's a time-limited commitment

CONS

- Potential loss of expertise or insight that has benefited the committee over time
- Potential loss of organizational memory
- May need to dedicate more time to identification, recruitment, and orientation of new members



Precedent

- 1. IUSM elected members serve two-year terms
- 2. Per IUPUI bylaws, the Committee on Committees:
 - Can specify the terms of service of each person appointed to a standing committee, provided that no appointment shall be for a term exceeding two years and that no person shall be eligible to serve more than three terms consecutively on the same committee
 - May designate that a standing committee will have staggered co-chairs, each serving two-year terms
- 3. University wide bylaws specify terms of service for several committees; most are two years with eligibility for reappointment

Questions for Consideration

- 1. How long should a term be?
- 2. How many consecutive terms can someone serve?
- 3. Should there be a required "sabbatical" before someone is allowed to run or be reappointed?
- 4. Should Chairs/Co-Chairs have term limits, and if so, for how long and for how many consecutive terms?
- 5. Should term limits be the same across all committees? Should they vary by committee or type of committee (standing vs. ad hoc)?
